Angelika (Angie) Mueller-Rowry became a member of Missouri CURE in 2014 after her incarcerated husband died of cancer at age 59, nine days after denial of medical parole, alone and shackled and chained to a hospital bed. Angie received her Master's in Social Work as well as degrees in Social Therapy and Mediation in Germany.

In her husband's family, Angie witnesses first-hand the impact that the New Jim Crow's Drug War had on the destruction of the African-American community, with more than one hundred years of prison time in one family.

Since 2007, she works as a community support specialist in the mental health field. Angle is involved with the Coalition to Abolish the Prison Industrial Complex (C.A.P.I.C.) and the St. Louis Committee for Prisoner Rights. As Coordinator of CURE's newly established Prisoner Health Committee, Angle uses her traumatic experiences with the prison's outsourced medical system during her husband's ordeal to assist inmates who are similarly exposed to arbitrary medical neglect and abuse. Angle's husband, Robert Rowry, was a warrior until the end. In this spirit, Angle continues his legacy.
